Every year, SAIGE offers scholarships to attend the Annual National Training Program to youth, aged 18 -25, who are attending an accredited school and who are interested in government careers. These scholarships consist of the full cost of program registration, travel, lodging and per diem for meals.

Youth Program attendees participate in leadership training and team building activities and hear from Indian Country's best inspirational speakers.

The youth are integrated into the larger training program, allowing for invaluable networking opportunities and mentorship development. They take part in a Career Fair with various organizations and agencies that offer ideas on career options.


