

Dorothy FireCloud-Prue is a member of the Rosebud Sioux Tribe. She has a Juris Doctorate from the New Mexico School of Law and is a member of the New Mexico State Bar.

She joined the federal government in 1992 as a Water Rights Specialist, BIA, Phoenix, focusing on Southwestern Indian water rights. From 1996 to 1998, she worked for the Pueblo of Zuni (IPA) developing their water rights program. She transferred to the US Forest Service in 1998 as the SW Tribal Program Manager. She served as the Team Leader of the National Team on Tribal Relations which developed an extensive report and policies to provide guidance on fulfilling the FS trust responsibilities. Several critical recommendations were passed in the 2008 Farm bill (i.e., temporary closures of Forest Service lands for tribal cultural activities).



She served as acting District Ranger in Hoonah, Alaska, Tongass National Forest and acting Deputy Forest Supervisor on the Black Hills National Forest. In June, 2006 she moved to the National Park Service as the Superintendent, Devils Tower National Monument. In June, 2012, she transferred to become Superintendent, Montezuma Castle National Monument, Tuzigoot National Monument and Montezuma Well, in the Camp Verde, AZ area.

She was an NPS representative on the Department of Interior, Government to Government Team, which was responsible for developing the DOI national consultation policy signed by Secretary Salazar in November, 2011.

Dorothy served as a SAIGE Board member from 2005 to 2007. She is married to Joe Prue, an avid golfer, who is retired from the Indian Health Service. Her son, Sean, is the last one at home and is a Junior at Camp Verde High School.
