Lavelle Mahle is a Hopi artist, painter, and Kachina carver, as well as an earring and gourd crafter. Lavelle was raised in Polacca and Keams Canyon, Arizona, and he started drawing in elementary school. In his early years, Lavelle used art to remember his culture and learned to respect his talents by recognizing what he could and could not draw. Lavelle attended Hopi Jr. and Sr. High School, graduating in 1994. Over the years, Lavelle won numerous awards for his art—including taking 1st place in painting, 1st place in diverse art, and 3rd place in wood carving at the Fifth Annual Hopi All Native Arts and Cultural Festival—and designed logos for various programs and entities. For Lavelle, art allows him to relax his mind, appreciate his culture, and remember his youth. When he is not painting, carving, or crafting, Lavelle spends time with his family and works at the Hopi Cultural Center in Human Resources and as a kitchen manager.
