

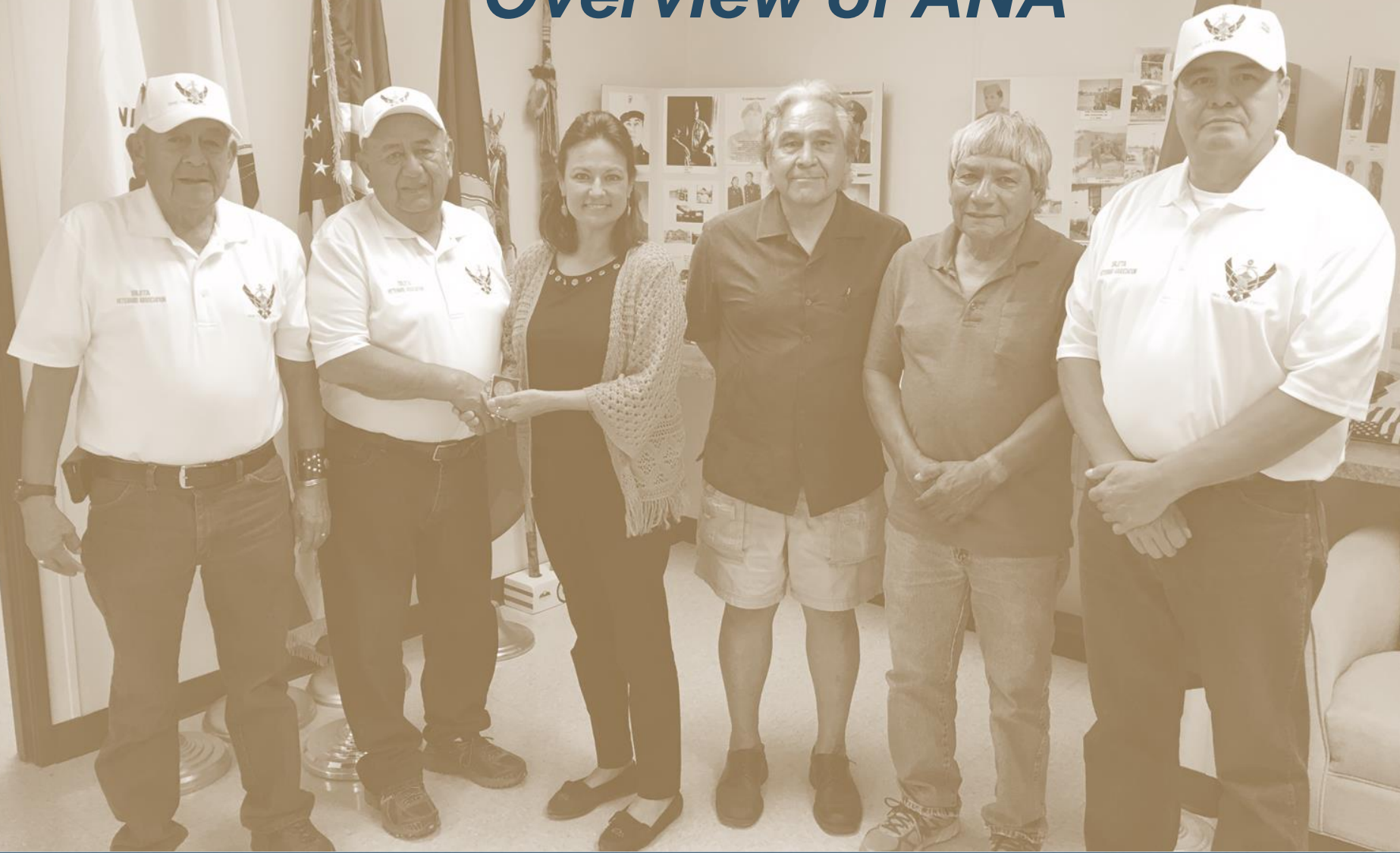

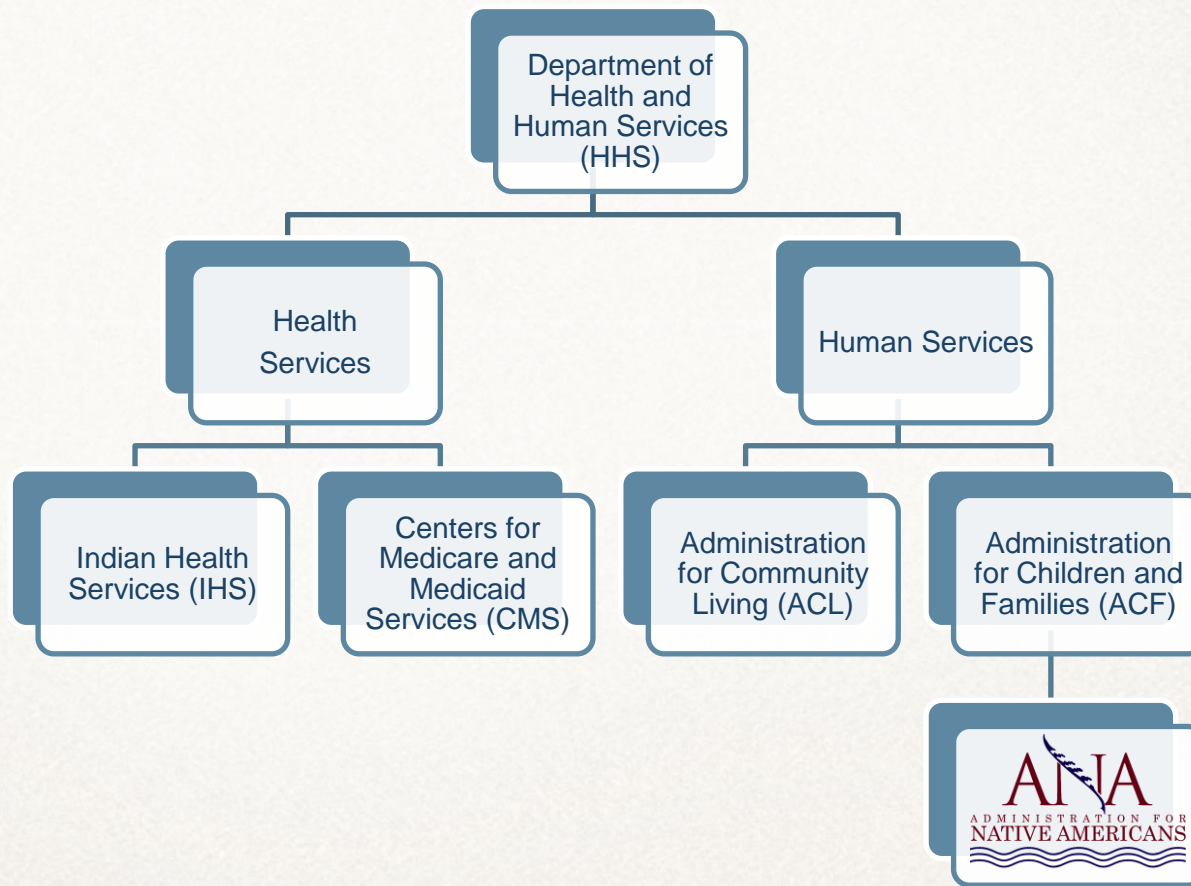

What is the Administration for Native Americans?


- ANA was created out of the 1974 Native American Programs Act (NAPA). The purpose for ANA is to:
...promote the goal of economic and social self-sufficiency for American Indians, Native Hawaiians, other Native American Pacific Islanders (including American Samoan Natives), and Alaska Natives.
- ANA serves all Native Americans, including:
 - Federally and state recognized tribes
 - Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders
 - Native Non-Profit Organizations

ANA does not provide direct services to individuals.



Our Philosophy:

Native American self-sufficiency requires the ability to generate and control the resources necessary to meet the social and economic goals of the community and the needs of community members.



Our Mission:

Promote self-sufficiency for Native Americans by providing grant funding for community based projects.



How do we do this?

- Competitive grants
- Training and technical assistance to both potential applicants and grantees
- Providing leadership on Native American issues in ACF and the Department of Health and Human Services

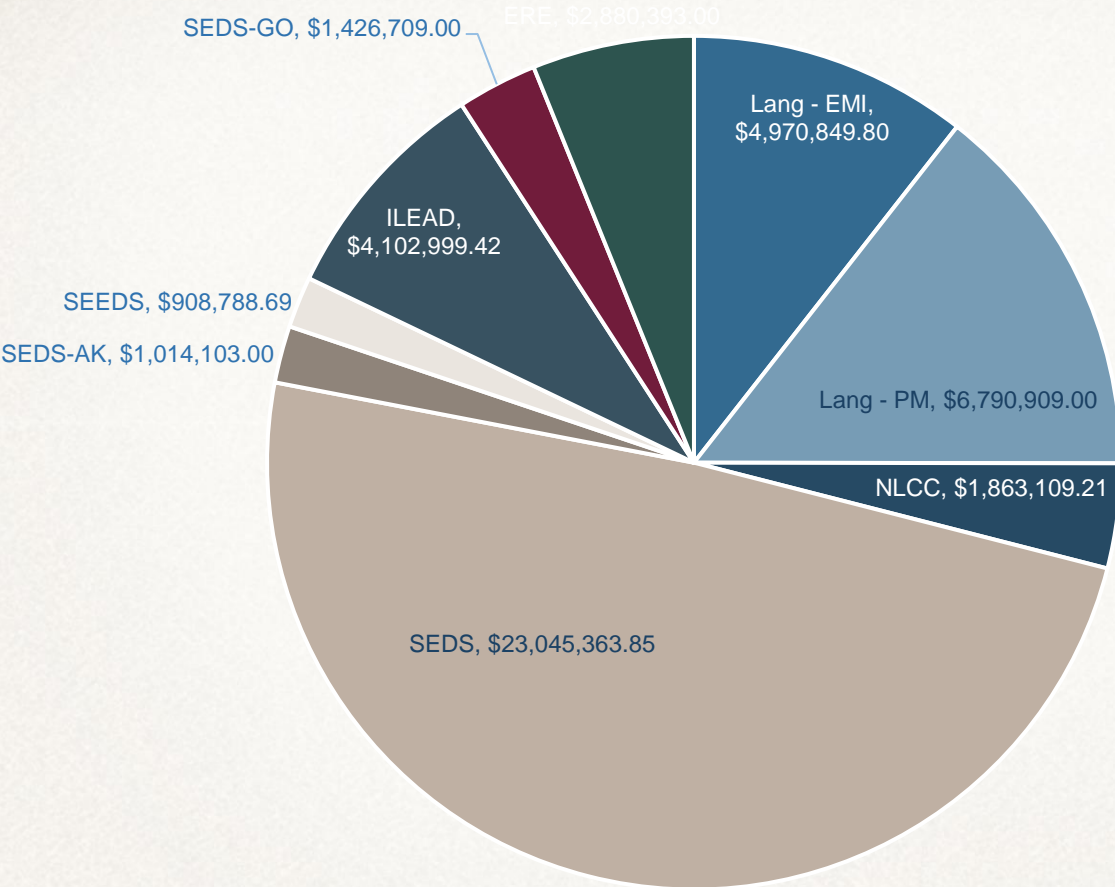


ANA's Funding

- In FY2019, ANA was funded at **\$54.5 million**, an **increase of \$500,000** over the FY 2018 appropriation level
- The Congressional Report language directs that **\$12 million of the funds support Native American language preservation activities**, including \$3 million for Generation Indigenous, and not less than \$4 million for language immersion programs.

ANA's Flexibility

- ANA's appropriations have very broad flexibility which can be used for almost everything with the exception of major construction, real property purchase and projects that would lead to litigation against the U.S. Government
- Pass through funds - Native American Programs Act 1974 - Sec. 813. [42 U.S.C. 2992b] Nothing in this title shall be construed to prohibit interagency funding agreements made between the Administration and other agencies of the Federal Government for the development and implementation of specific grants or projects.



ANA Training & Technical Assistance (TTA)

Core functions

- Work with low capacity Tribes and non-profit organizations to help achieve community based solutions
- Deliver training via in person curriculum based instruction, webinar training and application development
- Work with other government agencies and non Federal partners to maximize capacity building in Indian Country/Pacific Island communities
- Cross promote Federal initiatives and coordinate national meetings



ANA Training & Technical Assistance (TTA)

- ANA TTA Providers offer free training to applicants and grantees to help them plan and implement community-based projects.
- Throughout the trainings, participants work with Training Specialists.
- Types of training:
 - **Project Planning and Development**
 - **Pre-Application Training**
 - **Post Award Training**
 - **Technical Assistance for Grantees**

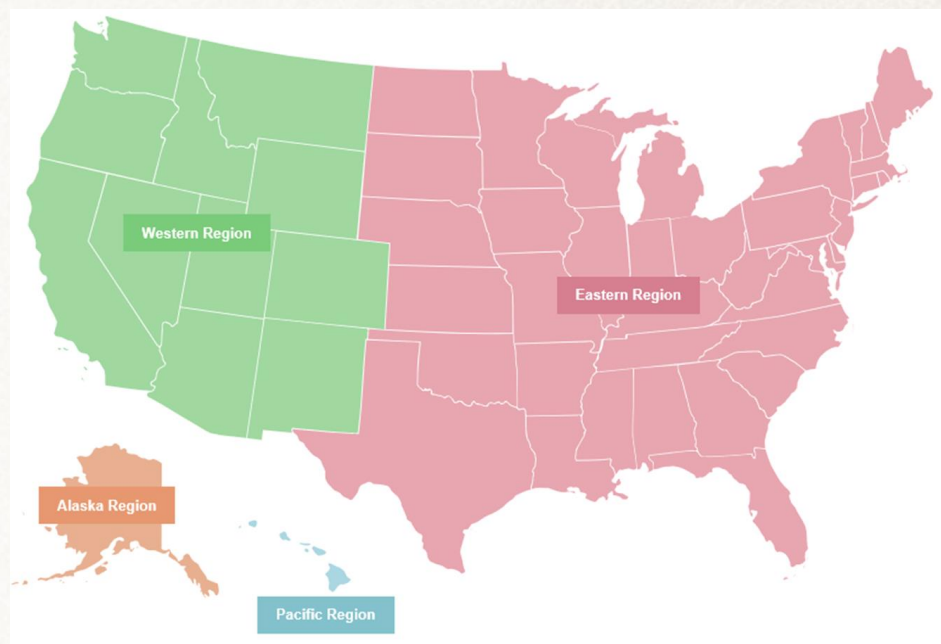
